- 11 GENERAL PROVISIONS

12 MAINTENANCE AND CARE OF PRIVATE VEHICLES

13 SEC. 201. No part of the funds appropriated in this 14 Act shall be used for the maintenance or care of private 15 vehicles, except for emergency assistance and cleaning as 16 may be provided under regulations relating to parking fa-17 cilities for the House of Representatives issued by the 18 Committee on House Administration and for the Senate 19 issued by the Committee on Rules and Administration.

20 FISCAL YEAR LIMITATION

SEC. 202. No part of the funds appropriated in this
Act shall remain available for obligation beyond fiscal year
2026 unless expressly so provided in this Act.

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RATES OF COMPENSATION AND DESIGNATION

2 SEC. 203. Whenever in this Act any office or position 3 not specifically established by the Legislative Pay Act of 4 1929 (46 Stat. 32 et seq.) is appropriated for or the rate 5 of compensation or designation of any office or position appropriated for is different from that specifically estab-6 7 lished by such Act, the rate of compensation and the des-8 ignation in this Act shall be the permanent law with re-9 spect thereto: *Provided*, That the provisions in this Act 10 for the various items of official expenses of Members, officers, and committees of the Senate and House of Rep-11 12 resentatives, and clerk hire for Senators and Members of 13 the House of Representatives shall be the permanent law 14 with respect thereto.

15 CONSULTING SERVICES

16 SEC. 204. The expenditure of any appropriation under this Act for any consulting service through procure-17 ment contract, under section 3109 of title 5, United States 18 19 Code, shall be limited to those contracts where such expenditures are a matter of public record and available for 20 21 public inspection, except where otherwise provided under 22 existing law, or under existing Executive order issued 23 under existing law.

1 COSTS OF LEGISLATIVE BRANCH FINANCIAL MANAGERS 2 COUNCIL

3 SEC. 205. Amounts available for administrative ex-4 penses of any legislative branch entity which participates 5 in the Legislative Branch Financial Managers Council (LBFMC) established by charter on March 26, 1996, shall 6 7 be available to finance an appropriate share of LBFMC 8 costs as determined by the LBFMC, except that the total 9 LBFMC costs to be shared among all participating legislative branch entities (in such allocations among the entities 10 11 as the entities may determine) may not exceed \$2,000. 12 LIMITATION ON TRANSFERS

SEC. 206. None of the funds made available in this
Act may be transferred to any department, agency, or instrumentality of the United States Government, except
pursuant to a transfer made by, or transfer authority provided in, this Act or any other appropriation Act.

18 GUIDED TOURS OF THE CAPITOL

19 SEC. 207. (a) Except as provided in subsection (b), 20 none of the funds made available to the Architect of the 21 Capitol in this Act may be used to eliminate or restrict 22 guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led 23 by employees and interns of offices of Members of Con-24 gress and other offices of the House of Representatives 25 and Senate, unless through regulations as authorized by

section 402(b)(8) of the Capitol Visitor Center Act of
 2008 (2 U.S.C. 2242(b)(8)).

3 (b) At the direction of the Capitol Police Board, or 4 at the direction of the Architect of the Capitol with the 5 approval of the Capitol Police Board, guided tours of the United States Capitol which are led by employees and in-6 7 terns described in subsection (a) may be suspended tempo-8 rarily or otherwise subject to restriction for security or re-9 lated reasons to the same extent as guided tours of the 10 United States Capitol which are led by the Architect of the Capitol. 11

12 LIMITATION ON TELECOMMUNICATIONS EQUIPMENT

PROCUREMENT

SEC. 208. None of the funds appropriated or otherwise made available under this Act may be used to acquire
telecommunications equipment produced by Huawei Technologies Company or ZTE Corporation.

18 PROHIBITION ON CERTAIN OPERATIONAL EXPENSES

SEC. 209. (a) None of the funds made available in
this Act may be used to maintain or establish a computer
network unless such network blocks the viewing,
downloading, and exchanging of pornography.

(b) Nothing in subsection (a) shall limit the use of
funds necessary for any Federal, State, tribal, or local law
enforcement agency or any other entity carrying out crimi-

nal investigations, prosecution, or adjudication activities 1 2 or other official government activities.

3 PLASTIC WASTE REDUCTION

4 SEC. 210. All agencies and offices funded by this Act that contract with a food service provider or providers 5 shall confer and coordinate with such food service provider 6 7 or providers, in consultation with disability advocacy 8 groups, to eliminate or reduce plastic waste, including 9 waste from plastic straws, explore the use of biodegradable 10 items, and increase recycling and composting opportuni-11 ties.

- 12 LIMITATION ON COST OF LIVING ADJUSTMENTS FOR 13

MEMBERS

14 SEC. 211. Notwithstanding any other provision of 15 law, no adjustment shall be made under section 601(a)16 of the Legislative Reorganization Act of 1946 (2 U.S.C. 17 4501) (relating to cost of living adjustments for Members of Congress) during fiscal year 2026. 18

19 EXTENSION OF PUMP ACT PROTECTIONS TO

21 SEC. 212. Section 203(a)(1) of the Congressional Ac-22 countability Act of 1995 (2 U.S.C. 1313(a)(1)) is amend-23 ed---

3	(INCLUDING TRANSFER OF FUNDS)

4 SEC. 213. (a) For an additional amount for "Contin-5 gent Expenses of the Senate—Sergeant at Arms and 6 Doorkeeper of the Senate", \$18,500,000, to remain avail-7 able until expended, of which \$15,000,000 shall be for en-8 hanced Member security and \$3,500,000 shall be for the 9 residential security system program: *Provided*, That 10 amounts made available pursuant to this subsection may be transferred to "Salaries, Officers and Employees—Of-11 fice of the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper" and "Con-12 13 tingent Expenses of the Senate—Sergeant at Arms Business Continuity and Disaster Recovery Fund": Provided 14 15 *further*, That the transfer authority provided pursuant to the preceding proviso is in addition to any other transfer 16 17 authority provided by law: Provided further, That of the 18 amounts made available pursuant to this subsection for 19 enhanced Member security, such sums as necessary may 20 be used to restore amounts, either directly, through reim-21 bursement, or through the transfer authority in the first 22 proviso, for obligations incurred for the same purposes by 23 the Sergeant at Arms and Doorkeeper of the Senate prior 24 to the date of enactment of this Act: Provided further, 25 That amounts made available pursuant to this subsection

shall be allocated in accordance with a spending plan sub-1 2 mitted to the Committee on Appropriations of the Senate. 3 (b) For an additional amount for "Capitol Police— 4 United States Capitol Police Mutual Aid Reimburse-5 ments", \$25,000,000, to remain available until September 6 30, 2030, for reimbursements for mutual aid and related 7 training, including mutual aid and training provided under 8 the agreements described in section 7302 of Public Law 9 108–458: *Provided*, That obligation of the funds made 10 available pursuant to this subsection be subject to notification to the Chairmen and Ranking Members of the Com-11 12 mittees on Appropriations of both Houses of Congress, the Senate Committee on Rules and Administration, and the 13 Committee on House Administration of the amount and 14 15 purpose of the expense within 15 days of obligation.

(c) For an additional amount for "Capitol Police—
General Expenses", \$1,000,000, to remain available until
expended, to provide support to the Senate Sergeant at
Arms residential security system program.

(d) Each amount provided by this section is designated by the Congress as being for an emergency requirement pursuant to section 4001(a)(1) of S. Con. Res.
14 (117th Congress), the concurrent resolution on the
budget for fiscal year 2022, and to legislation establishing

- 2 resentatives.
