

**S. 924, Further Additional Continuing Appropriations and Other  
Extensions Act, 2025**  
*Sec.-by-Sec. Summary*

**DIVISION A – FURTHER ADDITIONAL CONTINUING  
APPROPRIATIONS ACT, 2025**

**Sec. 101.** Further amends the Continuing Appropriations Act, 2025 (division A of Public Law 118-83), continuing funding at the levels and under the conditions provided in fiscal year 2024 appropriations acts for continuing projects and activities, with exceptions and modifications for technical and other budgetary issues and certain extensions and authorities, to April 11, 2025.

Amends existing section 156(b) to permit funds provided within the CR to be apportioned up to a higher rate of operations necessary for the *Columbia*-class submarine program.

Adds in the new subsections -

**Sec. 170. Federal Bureau of Investigation.**

Turns off a one-time rescission of FY2024 funds that are no longer available in FY2025.

**Sec. 171. Shipbuilding.**

Permits funds provided by the CR to be apportioned up to a rate of operations necessary for additional Navy contract awards for shipbuilding.

**Sec. 172. Disaster Relief Fund.**

Provides \$750 million to ensure FEMA has sufficient funds to provide life-sustaining activities and meet disaster relief needs through the period of the CR. The funds are designated as an emergency.

**Sec. 173. Office of Navajo and Hopi Relocation.**

Provides \$1.65 million for the Office of Navajo and Hopi Relocation. Without this provision the agency will be forced to shut down its operations in April before fulfilling its statutory obligations.

**Sec. 174. Death Gratuity.**

Provides funds for payment to the beneficiary of former Representative Sylvester Turner.

**DIVISION B—EXTENSIONS AND OTHER MATTERS**

**TITLE I—HEALTH EXTENSIONS**

**SUBTITLE A—PUBLIC HEALTH EXTENDERS**

**Sec. 2101. Extension for Community Health Centers, National Health Service Corps, and Teaching Health Centers That Operate GME Programs.**

Extends the Community Health Center Fund and the National Health Service Corps and the Teaching Health Center Graduate Medical Education program through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2102. Extension of Special Diabetes Programs.**

Extends the Special Diabetes Program for Type I Diabetes and the Special Diabetes Program for Indians through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2103. National Health Security Strategy.**

Updates the National Health Security Strategy through April 11, 2025.

**SUBTITLE B—MEDICARE**

**Sec. 2111. Extension of Increased Inpatient Hospital Payment Adjustment for Certain Low-Volume Hospitals.**

Extends the Medicare low-volume hospital payment adjustment through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2112. Extension of the Medicare-Dependent Hospital (MDH) Program.**

Extends the Medicare-dependent Hospital (MDH) program through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2113. Extension of Add-On Payments for Ambulance Services.**

Extends Medicare ground ambulance add-on payments through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2114. Extension of Funding for Quality Measure Endorsement, Input, and Selection.**

Provides funding to the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) for quality measure selection and to contract with a consensus-based entity to carry out duties related to quality measure endorsement, input, and selection activities through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2115. Extension of Funding Outreach and Assistance for Low-Income Programs.**

Provides funding for State Health Insurance Assistance Programs (SHIPs), Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs), Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs), and a contract with an entity to inform older Americans about benefits available under Federal and State programs through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2116. Extension of the Work Geographic Index Floor.**

Extends the 1.0 work geographic practice cost index (GPCI) floor used in the calculation of payments under the Medicare physician fee schedule through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2117. Extension of Certain Telehealth Flexibilities.**

Extends Medicare telehealth flexibilities that were extended in the Consolidated Appropriations Act, 2023, through April 11, 2025, establishes a special payment rule for telehealth services provided by Federally Qualified Health Centers and Rural Health Clinics, and imposes certain modifiers on telehealth services furnished incident to other services and telehealth visits furnished via contracts with certain virtual platforms.

**Sec. 2118. Extending Acute Hospital Care at Home Waiver Authorities.**

Extends the Acute Hospital Care at Home initiative, as currently authorized under CMS waivers and flexibilities, through April 11, 2025. This section also establishes the parameters for a new interim study and report on the Acute Hospital Care at Home initiative and officially names the initiative after Senators Thomas R. Carper and Tim Scott as well as Representatives Brad R. Wenstrup, D.P.M. and Earl Blumenauer in recognition of their leadership.

**Sec. 2119. Extension of Temporary Inclusion of Authorized Oral Antiviral Drugs as Covered Part D Drugs.**

Extends Medicare Part D coverage of certain oral antiviral drugs through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2120. Medicare Improvement Fund.**

Reduces the amount of funding in the Medicare Improvement Fund from \$1.251 billion to \$1.018 billion.

**SUBTITLE C—HUMAN SERVICES**

**Sec. 2131. Sexual Risk Avoidance Education Extension.**

Extends the Sexual Risk Avoidance Education (SRAE) program under Title V of the Social Security Act through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2132. Personal Responsibility Education Extension.**

Extends the Personal Responsibility Education Program (PREP) under Title V of the Social Security Act through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2133. Extension of Funding for Family-to-Family Health Information Centers.**

Extends the Family-to-Family Health Information Centers Program under Title V of the Social Security Act through April 11, 2025.

**SUBTITLE D—MEDICAID**

**Sec. 2141. Eliminating Certain Disproportionate Share Hospital Payment Cuts.**

Delays the Medicaid Disproportionate Share Hospital (DSH) allotment reductions through April 11, 2025.

**TITLE II—MISCELLANEOUS EXTENSIONS**

**Sec. 2201. Commodity Futures Trading Commission Whistleblower Program.**

Creates a separate account to fund the administrative, programmatic, and personnel expenses of the Whistleblower Office and the Office of Customer Education and Outreach of the Commodity Futures Trading Commission (“CFTC”). Authorizes the CFTC to transfer \$10,000,000 from the Customer Protection Fund (“Fund”) to ensure continuity of operations in the event the Fund is depleted due to payment of whistleblower awards, and extends these provisions through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2202. Protection of Certain Facilities and Assets from Unmanned Aircraft.**

Extends DHS and DOJ’s existing authority to counter credible unmanned aircraft system (UAS) threats to large public gatherings and certain facilities, assets, and individuals in the U.S. through April 11, 2025. Among other missions, DHS and DOJ components use the authority to protect against UAS posing credible threats at Special Event Assessment Rating (SEAR)/National Special Security Events (NSSE) events, detect and mitigate drones used for smuggling at our nation’s borders, and to detect and prevent the introduction of weapons, cell phones, escape tools, and contraband via drone at prisons.

**Sec. 2203. Additional Special Assessment.**

Extends the special assessment of \$5,000 on nonindigent persons or entities convicted of certain offenses involving sexual abuse or human trafficking through April 11, 2025.

**Sec. 2204. National Cybersecurity Protection System (NCPS) Authorization.**

Extends the authorization for CISA to provide federal agencies with cybersecurity services through April 11, 2025. The National Cybersecurity Protection System, which includes EINSTEIN – a cyberattack detection and blocking service – is a suite of technical cybersecurity services that federal civilian executive branch agencies can use to maintain situational awareness and prevent attacks. Without an extension of this authorization, CISA will not have the authority to provide services on federal executive branch networks, nor would CISA be able to use the technical threat information from one agency to protect other agencies or share the threat information with the private sector.

**TITLE III— BUDGETARY EFFECTS**

**Sec. 2301. Budgetary Effects.**

Technical budgetary provisions.
